Help keep hedgehogs safe with this house which uses a predator baffle guard to protect them from foxes, badgers and other potential

The pitched roof helps water runoff, and it is covered with a waterproof felt for durability and to ensure they are safe and comfortable in their new habitat. Position out of direct sunlight and winds, preferably in a dry area such as under shrubs or behind sheds. These

are areas that hedgehogs would naturally choose to take shelter, so this will increase the chances of them inhabiting the house.

Use the included guide to learn more about the species and how to protect and care for them. Knowing information such as to not give them milk as it makes them ill, will help keep your hedgehogs healthy and happy. It is advisable that you treat the wood before assembling to extend its life. • ARDEN lighting is not just about security and being able to see. It also brings a sense of joy and wonder and helps to open up your outdoor spaces for extra un with friends and family.

These are the best ways to bring a ittle light to your life and brighten your garden at night.

#### **MAKE A SWITCH**

There are three main approaches for external lighting. First, permanent lights fitted by an electrician. Second, low-voltage lighting you can install yourself. Or the easiest option – solar.

Practical lighting installed for round-the-clock access to the garage or to help you see down the garden path is best bought from a DIY shop so it is fit for purpose and built to last. At the click of a switch, this will give

you electricity outside and can be a ife-saver, especially in the winter to prevent stumbling around in the dark.

These permanent additions are wired into the mains, so that's why you need a pro to get them going. But they tend to be brighter and so better suited for practical use.

#### SHINE ON

You can soon shine a spotlight on security worries with outdoor lighting. Again, these are best properly installed to your mains.

At the back of the house, flood lights work well and can come with novement sensors to save energy.

Research suggests that burglars are soon put off by evidence of occupancy. such as lights, so it can function as a deterrent too. But you don't want to put off wildlife in the process.

So do not position them too close to any feeding stations or they will be constantly flashing when birds fly in, which will get on your nerves too.

Use security lighting around entrances to keep side entries lit and nighlight potential trip hazards.

#### **GOOD MOODS**

Lighting for ambience is really worth your while. Even some subtle spotlights around the garden can

Select low-voltage lighting solutions



These aren't as bright as those you can turn on with a flick of the switch but are definitely brighter and last longer than solar-powered options.

Some tasks are best done when out. of the heat of the day and I have found that removing slugs and snails is a joh I can do when the sun has gone down.

So identify the areas of the patio or garden you need access to later on in the evening and focus first on lighting those bits up.

That's all you need to know to keep you aglow in the garden this summer.
