move into autumn, what is the best thing to do with fallen leaves? Jill, Exeter

Use autumn leaf-fall to create leaf mould, which is a great soil conditioner. Simply pile the leaves together - ideally in a hessian bag so moisture can get in - and leave behind a shed for a year where they will break down. It'll be worth the wait as you'll have a free and eco-friendly soil improver.

Protect your autumn bulbs from squirrels with soap. Use a cheese grater to get some shavings and place them nearby they hate the taste!

This year's winner is the Include Me 2 Club in Glasgow. Volunteers started their Allotment Angel project in April 2018, taking over a very unkempt allotment plot in the city's East End.
